Little Free Libraries of Oshkosh

Miniature libraries built by high school students pop up in community

Oshkosh, WI—Celebrate Education, an annual event that honors the educators, administrators and volunteers in our schools, is just around the corner. Last year, a Celebrate Education grant was awarded by Mid-Morning Kiwanis Club of Oshkosh to the Oshkosh North High School Vocational Skills Class for their program, Little Free Libraries.

“Because of the Little Free Libraries program, the Vocational Skills class has gone above and beyond giving back to their community,” says Jill Williams, an advisor at Oshkosh North High School. “They’ve advanced their communication skills by setting up

meetings with the Oshkosh Parks Director and the Oshkosh Parks Advisory Board, as well as improving life skills such as reading a tape measure, completing purchase orders and learning about various building materials—wood, paint, stain, plexi-glass, screws and other tools.

Little Free Libraries originated in 2009 in the front yard of Todd Bol’s house, a Wisconsin man that wanted to pay tribute to his mother, a teacher and an avid reader. Bol designed a miniature schoolhouse atop a wooden post that could house a small amount of books. The idea behind Little Free Libraries is for people to find one in their community, bring a book to put in the library to share with others, and take a new one to read. This program has since spread across the United States and into neighborhoods all over the world.

“I never thought I would get up in front of my class and be able to communicate a need for these Little Free Libraries, let alone talk to the city to request and receive permission for this program,” said Anthony Wegenke, a student in the Vocational Skills class at Oshkosh North High School. “Who knew it was so simple?”
